Step One – get accepted at Drake State, GET YOUR A-NUMBER

Apply for admission to Drake State - The Office of Admissions/ Registrar is the first stop for students who desire to enter the college. All students will need to complete an <u>Electronic Application</u> for admission to the College, and other necessary documents for acceptance into the college. Step Three – Complete general education classes with a grade of A, B or C

Please note that while D may be a passing grade in some programs, D is not a passing grade in the nursing program.

Best practices tell us that taking all your general education classes prior to taking nursing classes will increase your chance of success in nursing. You can register for the general education courses (see information packet attached). If you have taken these courses already, please make sure that your official transcripts are sent to Drake State from the College where you completed those courses.

IF YOU WISH TO TRANSFER FROM A BSN PROGRAM:

Please know that the BSN courses do not transfer fully into the associate degree program. for example, our fundamentals of nursing course includes pharmacology, health assessment, community nursing and health promotion as well as nursing concepts. You may have to repeat all nursing classes.

- Unconditional admission to the college
- A completed application for admission to nursing program received before published deadline.
- A minimum of 2.5 GPA for nursing required academic core courses and minimum 2.0 cumulative GPA at current, native institution or cumulative 2.0 in institution from which student is transferring
- A minimum of 2.5 GPA cumulative high school GPA for students without prior college courses (GED will be used if applicable)
- Meeting the essential functions for nursing
- Eligibility for ENG 101, MTH 100, and BIO 201

NURSING (ADN WITH PN OPTION AND MOBILITY) PROGRAM ADMISSION CRITERIA

- Unconditional admission to the college
- A completed application for admission to nursing program received before published deadline.
- ACT composite score National or Residual OR HESI entrance exam (see page 3)
- A minimum of 2.5 GPA for nursing required academic core courses and minimum 2.0 cumulative GPA at current, native institution or cumulative 2.0 in institution from which student is transferring
- A minimum of 2.5 GPA cumulative high school GPA for students without prior college courses (GED will be used if applicable)
- Meeting the essential functions for nursing
- Eligibility for ENG 101, MTH 100, and BIO 201
- Mobility students are additionally required to provide proof of unencumbered, Alabama licensure (i.e. LPN, Paramedic). No work history is required. No associate degree is required for paramedics. Prerequisites required for Mobility program application: ENG 101, MTH 100 or higher level math, BIO 201 & 202, SPH 106 or 107, and PSY 210.

ASSOCIATE DEGREE NURSING PROGRAM SELECTION CRITERIA

- *ACT score. There are 36 points possible. No time limit on when the ACT was taken. For HESI score, convert the percentage score by (HESI percent X .36).
- Points for grades in the following nursing required core general educational courses are as documented:

A = 3 points, B = 2 points, C = 0 point English Composition I Intermediate College Algebra Anatomy & Physiology I Anatomy & Physiology II

- Additional 10 points awarded by the institution (see next page for the point distribution)
- *Minimum 2.5 GPA required in the core general educational courses for the nursing program. Not all courses may have been completed at time of admission. Core general educational courses taken in high school as dual enrollment will be used in GPA calculation.

Practical nursing core courses (for stand-alone PN programs): ENG 101, MTH 100, BIO 201, BIO 202, Human Growth & Development, and Speech.

Associate degree nursing core courses: ENG 101, MTH 100, BIO 201, BIO 202, Human Growth & Development, Speech, BIO 220, and a Humanities elective.

- Student's lab coat must have a collar, but no knit cuffs. The length of the coat should fall below the bottom of the buttocks, which will allow it to be longer than the scrub top.
 No deviations in style or color is permitted. (<u>Drake State logo will be required to be Monogrammed on the left upper chest area of all lab coats.</u> Price -\$7.50 each)
- If you choose not to monogram you must apply the patch to the left upper sleeve of the lab coat and use the name plate.
- Long sleeve **white** tees/thermals are allowed to be worn underneath blue uniform. No other colors are allowed

Shoes/footwear

- Nursing shoes/Tennis shoes must be a full shoe with a back (<u>no clogs</u>). No holes in the shoes are permitted. Shoes must be completely white; no color allowed. Parkway Scrubs does sale a Tennis shoe (<u>New Balance</u>) which has a small amount of grey stitching which has been approved in this program. (See picture below)

DRAKE STATE COMMUNITY AND TECHNICAL COLLEGE NURSING PROGRAMS ESSENTIAL FUNCTIONS

The Alabama Community College System endorses the Americans' with Disabilities Act. In accordance with College policy, when requested, reasonable accommodations may be provided for individuals with disabilities.

Physical, cognitive, psychomotor, affective and social abilities are required in unique combinations to provide safe and effective nursing care. The applicant/student must be able to meet the essential functions with or without reasonable accommodations throughout the program of learning. Admission, progression and graduation are contingent upon one's ability to demonstrate the essential functions delineated for the nursing programs with or without reasonable accommodations. The nursing programs and/or its affiliated clinical agencies may identify additional essential functions. The nursing programs reserve the right to amend the essential functions as deemed necessary.

In order to be admitted and to progress in the nursing program one must possess a functional level of ability to perform the duties required of a nurse. Admission or progression may be denied if a student is unable to demonstrate the essential functions with or without reasonable accommodations.

The essential functions delineated are those deemed necessary the Alabama Community College System nursing programs. No representation regarding industrial standards is implied. Similarly, any reasonable accommodations made will be determined and applied to the respective nursing program and may vary from reasonable accommodations made by healthcare employers.

The essential functions delineated below are necessary for nursing program admission, progression and graduation and for the provision of safe and effective nursing care. The essential functions include but are not limited to the ability to:

1) Sensory Perception

- a) Visual
 - i) Observe and discern subtle changes in physical conditions and the environment
 - ii) Visualize different color spectrums and color changes
 - iii) Read fine print in varying levels of light
 - iv) Read for prolonged periods of time
 - v) Read cursive writing
 - vi) Read at varying distances
 - vii) Read data/information displayed on monitors/equipment
- b) Auditory
 - i) Interpret monitoring devices
 - ii) Distinguish muffled sounds heard through a stethoscope
 - iii) Hear and discriminate high and low frequency sounds produced by the body and the environment
 - iv) Effectively hear to communicate with others
- c) Tactile
 - i) Discern tremors, vibrations, pulses, textures, temperature, shapes, size, location and other physical characteristics
- d) Olfactory
 - i) Detect body odors and odors in the environment

2) Communication/Interpersonal Relationships

- a) Verbally and in writing, engage in a two-way communication and interact effectively with others, from a variety of social, emotional, cultural and intellectual backgrounds
- b) Work effectively in groups
- c) Work effectively independently
- d) Discern and interpret nonverbal communication
- e) Express one's ideas and feelings clearly
- f) Communicate with others accurately in a timely manner
- g) Obtain communications from a computer

3) Cognitive/Critical Thinking

- a) Effectively read, write and comprehend the English language
- b) Consistently and dependably engage in the process of critical <u>thinking</u> in order to formulate and implement safe and ethical nursing decisions in a variety of health care settings
- c) Demonstrate satisfactory performance on written examinations including mathematical computations without a calculator
- d) Satisfactorily achieve the program objectives

Motor Function

- a) Handle small delicate equipment/objects without extraneous movement, contamination or destruction
- b) Move, position, turn, transfer, assist with lifting or lift and carry clients without injury to clients, self or others
- c) Maintain balance from any position
- d) Stand on both legs
- e) Coordinate hand/eye movements
- f) Push/pull heavy objects without injury to client, self or others
- g) Stand, bend, walk and/or sit for 6-12 hours in a clinical setting performing physical activities requiring energy without jeopardizing the safety of the client, self or others
- h) Walk without a cane, walker or crutches
- i) Function with hands free for nursing care and transporting items
- j) Transport self and client without the use of electrical devices

- k) Flex, abduct and rotate all joints freely
- I) Respond rapidly to emergency situations
- m) Maneuver in small areas
- n) Perform daily care functions for the client
- o) Coordinate fine and gross motor hand movements to provide safe effective nursing care
- p) Calibrate/use equipment
- q) Execute movement required to provide nursing care in all health care settings
- r) Perform CPR and physical assessment
- s) Operate a computer

4) Professional Behavior

- a) Convey caring, respect, sensitivity, tact, compassion, empathy, tolerance and a healthy attitude toward others
- b) Demonstrate a mentally healthy attitude that is age appropriate in relationship to the client
- c) Handle multiple tasks concurrently
- d) Perform safe, effective nursing care for clients in a caring context
- e) Understand and follow the policies and procedures of the College and clinical agencies
- f) Understand the consequences of violating the student code of conduct
- g) Understand that posing a direct threat to others is unacceptable and subjects one to discipline
- h) Meet qualifications for licensure by examination as stipulated by the Alabama Board of Nursing
- i) Not to pose a threat to self or others
- j) Function effectively in situations of uncertainty and stress inherent in providing nursing care
- k) Adapt to changing environments and situations
- I) Remain free of chemical dependency
- m) Report promptly to clinicals and remain for 6-12 hours on the clinical unit
- n) Provide nursing care in an appropriate time frame
- o) Accepts responsibility, accountability, and ownership of one's actions
- p) Seek supervision/consultation in a timely manner
- **Q)** Examine and modify one's own behavior when it interferes with nursing care or learning
